David Solomon of Edison had always loved his three-mile walks with his dog Rico by his side. Along with the 60-year-old real estate professional's commute to New York City, those treks were part of his daily routine. But in 2016, Mr. Solomon was diagnosed with bone-on-bone arthritis in his hips.

"I started using a cane when I walked the dog," he says. His mobility grew worse. Climbing the stairs at Penn Station became increasingly difficult and donning socks and shoes required adaptive devices.

Mr. Solomon had bilateral anterior hip replacement surgery at RWJUH Somerset in 2018. He was up and pushing a walker accompanied by a physical therapist within hours. He was discharged the next day and was back at work a month later.

"I walk up steps easily now, without looking at my feet. I'm completely mobile and have no restrictions," Mr. Solomon said.

Best of all, dog walks are longer, faster and enjoyable again.
