OUR FIRST OUTPATIENT CENTER IN MONMOUTH COUNTY OPENED ITS DOORS TO PATIENTS THIS SUMMER

CSH is open for outpatient services in Monmouth County, NJ for the first time in our 130 year history. The second of four new outpatient centers funded by the **Transforming Lives 2.0** capital campaign was completed this summer and opened its doors to patients in July.

The opening of this new outpatient center is an important milestone in the CSH Foundation's \$45 million **Transforming Lives 2.0** capital campaign that is funding the expansion of CSH to reach more children living with special healthcare needs. This new outpatient center provides convenient access to specialized care for more than 200,000 children who live in the area.

This campaign is the largest in CSH Foundation's history and is led by a team of New Jersey super stars including former Major League Baseball All-Star and Toms River resident, Todd Frazier, and his wife, Jackie. The Fraziers are working alongside members of the CSH Foundation Board of Trustees and capital campaign co-chairs, Mark Montenero, President of Autoland Toyota, Chrysler, Jeep, Dodge, and RAM Trucks, and Ed McKenna, Senior Partner at McKenna, Dupont, Stone & Washburne and former Mayor of Red Bank.

"As a resident of Monmouth County, I am thrilled about the opening of this new facility and the impact it will have for children in Eatontown and surrounding areas," said McKenna, "Every time I walk into a Children's Specialized Hospital facility, I see miracles – and now I will be able to see them happening for children in my own community."

The new CSH outpatient center occupies the second floor of the brand new, four-story Anne Vogel Family Care and Wellness Center, an RWJBH facility that provides comprehensive women's services, pediatric specialty services, wellness education and nutrition resources, specialty surgical services, a blood drawing station and an Urgent Care Center.

"Being part of the RWJBarnabas Health Children's Health Network and the Anne Vogel Family Care and Wellness Center not only allows us to enhance availability to our specialized services for children and families that need us but also provides local families with access to a variety of medical services for their entire family in one convenient location," added Dr. Matthew B. McDonald III, President and CEO, Children's Specialized Hospital.

The **Transforming Lives 2.0** capital campaign has raised over 75% of the \$45 million goal to bring the new Monmouth and Union outpatient centers to fruition. The remaining funds are being raised through the end of 2022 so we can complete the funding of the construction of the new Bayonne and Toms River outpatient centers, the renovations to our long term care center in Mountainside, and vital research studies that will design the next generation of pediatric care. ■

PSEG FOUNDATION HELPS CSH BREAK BARRIERS TO CARE THROUGH SOCIAL DETERMINANTS OF HEALTH SCREENING PROGRAM

Social Determinants of Health (SDoH) are defined by the World Health Organization as the "conditions in which people are born, grow, work, live, and age, and the wide set of forces and systems shaping the conditions of daily life." Social determinants of health for children include income level, housing quality, food insecurity, parental mental health, and lack of access to childcare or quality education, all of which affect a child's overall wellness.

SDoH account for 80% of all health outcomes, and when children do not have access to the best resources, they can experience health inequity. Without intervention, a cycle of poor health can be perpetuated for generations. But by shifting our approach to actively screen our patients for SDoH, Children's Specialized Hospital (CSH) will break through barriers to advance health equity and ensure that every child we treat has the opportunity to be as healthy as possible.

As a provider of family-centered care, CSH is committed to treating the whole child—body, mind, and soul—and

including families in their child's care plan. More than 50% of the families who bring their children to CSH for treatment have low to moderate income levels. In response, the Center for Discovery, Innovation and Development (CDID) at Children's Specialized Hospital (CSH) has launched an initiative to uncover and address SDoH in our patient population because our clinicians and experts understand that caring for children goes beyond their medical needs.

"Addressing SDoH is vital in improving health, reducing the disparities in healthcare, and improving the community," said Victoria Porterfield Gregorio, PhD, EDM, Director, CDID at CSH.

CDID has initiated a fully integrated screening program across all CSH sites to identify SDoH for our patients and their families. Funded by a \$300,000 grant from PSEG Foundation, this screening program has been rolled out to nearly all 15 CSH locations across New Jersey.

"By addressing SDoH, the PSEG Foundation is helping to build thriving and sustainable communities, aiming to break the cycle of poverty and poor health outcomes for impoverished communities," said Calvin Ledford, President PSEG Foundation. "Moreover, this collaborative effort will help to reduce inequalities and inequities in the healthcare system, provide better health outcomes for patients and families, as well as help build a healthier and better community."

CSH staff screens patient families for housing situations, family structure, transportation methods, availability of healthy foods, as well as other social determinants that impact our patients' health. The screening process has helped us to identify families in need of additional services and provide them with the resources they need to access them.

When CSH clinicians and providers review a child's medical chart, the notes from the family's SDoH screening are included. This information gives a more holistic view of the patient's overall health and wellbeing. For example, if a clinician knows that a family is suffering from food insecurity,

they can factor the lack of a healthy, balanced diet into their assessment of the child they are treating.

SDoH data is also used to help identify appropriate referrals to necessary services and develop partnerships with community organizations like the Community Food Bank of New Jersey. Since the start of SDoH screenings at CSH, hundreds of our patient families who identify as food insecure have received packages of shelf-stable, healthy food at CSH facilities through this partnership with the food bank. The SDoH screening program has led to an additional partnership with Moms Helping Moms Foundation which provides diapers for our patient families in need.

"The funds provided by PSEG Foundation are critical to the success of this program," said Philip Salerno III, President and Chief Development Officer at Children's Specialized Hospital Foundation. "PSE&G has been a steadfast community partner for many years and funding this program proves their commitment to the health and well-being of children and families in the communities we both serve."

Since the launch of the program, CSH has conducted nearly 10,000 screenings with families. More than 2,500 families have been provided resources and assistance specific to their needs. Additionally, families who have participated in the program have had a significantly reduced rate of missed appointments compared to families who have not yet been screened.

"Our whole experience with Children's Specialized Hospital has been remarkable, but this goes above and beyond" shared one parent. "It is such a relief that there are still organizations that truly care about the whole family and how to keep our kids healthy." ■

CSH IS #1 IN PATIENT OUTCOMES

Children's Specialized Hospital is the nation's leading provider of pediatric rehabilitation, the region's largest provider of autism services, and recognized by Newsweek as one of the World's Best Specialized Hospitals. In addition to our unique programs and services, another reason we are recognized as the leader in specialized pediatrics is because we consistently rank in the 100th percentile on the WeeFIM System, a pediatric version of the Functional Independence Measure™ (FIM) System.

WeeFIM documents and tracks functional performance in children and adolescents with acquired or congenital disabilities by measuring a child's need for assistance, in addition to the severity of disability. It also provides a method to evaluate outcomes for pediatric rehabilitation programs.



"Children's Specialized Hospital has been ranked in WeeFIM's 100th percentile for the past three quarters which reconfirms what we already knew—that we are the #1 pediatric rehabilitation hospital in the nation," said Dr. Matthew B. "Thanks to the generosity of donors like you and the steadfast commitment of our innovative and skilled team, we are able to ensure that when a patient is discharged from our services, they are returning home with the best possible outcomes."

We are proud to be renowned for providing the best possible outcomes for families in New Jersey and are dedicated to expanding our services in pursuit of a world where all children have the chance to reach their full potential.

Early Intervention is the Most Critical Thing We Can Do for Our Children

John Ryan's mom, Emeline, describes her baby as a sweet boy who is very calm and warm. He likes to cuddle, read books and attentively watch those around him. When John Ryan was six-months-old, however, his parents began noticing that he was very "floppy." He was not holding his head up or able to attempt sitting up on his own—two important milestones for a baby. At his six-month checkup, the family pediatrician confirmed that John Ryan's development was delayed and she additionally noted an abnormal pattern in John Ryan's head growth which was consistently measuring in the 98th percentile for his age.

After that visit, John Ryan's pediatrician ordered an ultrasound and referred the family to a pediatric neurologist for an MRI. The MRI confirmed what the ultrasound had shown and John Ryan was diagnosed with **macrocephaly with benign congenital hypotonia**. Macrocephaly shows as an overly large head caused by abnormalities in the brain. In John Ryan's case, he was experiencing fluid build-up that was causing pressure in his brain resulting in his lack of muscle tone, or hypotonia. John Ryan was immediately recommended for intensive therapy treatment.

"When I first learned of his diagnosis I was overwhelmed and concerned," said Emeline. "My husband had an aneurysm that we had treated a few



years ago. We are no strangers to being in a hospital environment. However, when it is a child of your own it seems much scarier and much more uncertain. After going through all the doctors, neurologists and MRI, we landed at CSH. From there on we felt like we could exhale. They answered all of our questions, and made me feel normal in a very uncomfortable situation. I am very glad to have found a team at CSH that we can trust."

John Ryan began physical and occupational therapy at the Children's Specialized Hospital (CSH) New Brunswick inpatient facility. Emeline shared that John Ryan loves everything about the environment at CSH—from the front desk to all of the therapists. She also explained that he feels extremely comfortable during his sessions and absolutely loves the large selection of toys available to play with.

"Working with his therapists, Samantha and Stephanie, has been such a great experience for us at CSH. They have an extraordinary way of not only making sure that we feel comfortable but also understanding what our goals are and how we can bring what we learn at therapy to our home," said Emeline.

Struggling with motor planning, John Ryan would get easily frustrated because he did not have the ability retrieve an object that he wanted. During the months he spent at CSH he made great progress and is beginning to understand what steps to take to either get to the toy he wants or communicate his wants with his family. His muscles are getting much stronger and he is able to do things that he could not before, like standing and dancing.

Now, just three months after his first birthday, John Ryan is making significant progress. It was recently discovered that John Ryan has a rare genetic condition called GATAD2B-associated neurodevelopmental disorder (GAND). GAND affects the way a child's brain develops and the most common symptoms are severe intellectual disability, poor speech development, a large head, and low muscle tone. This new diagnosis provides a more detailed road map for John Ryan's rehabilitative care at CSH.

CSH has given John Ryan's family a sense of peace and normalcy. Having a busy home with two children and working parents makes the family appreciate the time that they have together. John Ryan has an older sister, Julianna, who has been educated about her brother's condition by her parents and his care team. She understood immediately that her little brother could not interact with her as some



other babies would and she is very sweet and gentle with him. John Ryan's father, Joao, enjoys learning about what his son does at therapy, as he also experienced delayed milestones as a child. Joao explained that being able to help his son is extremely rewarding because he did not have the same resources as John Ryan does today at CSH.

When asked if she has advice for families going through similar situations, Emeline said, "Being patient through the process is very important, there are many rough and frustrating days. However, early intervention is the most critical thing we can do for our children. I did not wait to get him the help he needed. I sought after professionals and made sure I got informed. I believe that was what made therapy so successful for us. The first year of their life they are just soaking up everything they learn and I wanted to take advantage of that to be able to help him build his strength early on."

Emeline continued, "It can feel lonely, but there are so many families going through the same things and we are all learning as we go. The most important thing we can do is bring what we learn in our therapy sessions and apply it at home. Working in alignment with the CSH team has helped us in so many ways. We can only reach our goals if we do the work, too." ■

THE FIRST ANNUAL I LOVE CSH GIVING DAY WAS A HOME RUN



On June 15th, Major League Baseball All-Star and Olympian, Todd Frazier, teamed up with Nikos Kaymakcian, a patient at the Children's Specialized Hospital (CSH) Toms River outpatient center for the first ever I LOVE CSH Giving Day. This inaugural celebration was launched to bring the New Jersey community together in support of the thousands of local children living with special healthcare needs and their families.

Throughout the day, patients at all CSH outpatient centers spun a prize wheel to win a gift as they came in for their appointments. The children at our inpatient hospital in New Brunswick and those who live in our long term care centers in Mountainside and Toms River received gift bags full of fun items.

That evening, CSH staff, supporters, members of the CSH Foundation Board of Trustees, the Frazier family and the Kaymakcian family gathered at ShoreTown Ballpark in Lakewood, NJ where Nikos threw the ceremonial first pitch to Todd Frazier before the Jersey Shore BlueClaws game.

Nikos, the true super star of the day, was born with spina bifida, a birth defect in which an area of the spinal column

doesn't form properly, leaving a section of the spinal cord and spinal nerves exposed through an opening in the back. This diagnosis was uncovered during his mother's prenatal scan at 20 weeks gestation.

"The doctor explained to us scientifically what this diagnosis was and what to expect, saying that our son would never walk or use the bathroom on his own, and that he would need a shunt to drain fluid from his brain," shared Nicole, Nikos' mom. "I remember crying thinking my son was going to have no quality of life, asking this doctor to tell me there is a chance, even just a 1% chance, that my son would be able to do these things—and he said no."

After visiting a neurosurgeon for a second opinion, Nikos' parents found hope. Nikos was born October 29, 2018 and the very next day the neurosurgeon performed the necessary surgery to repair his spine. The family kept up with Nikos' care which led them to CSH for a physical therapy evaluation just before his first birthday. He's been working with our expert therapists ever since.

"One of the biggest obstacles that Nikos has overcome is walking. I think back to my 20-week ultrasound when the doctor told me my son would never walk and now he is," shares Nicole. "He used to use a light gait to assist, and now he's walking with braces and his walker, taking steps on his own. My greatest hope is that he will continue to get stronger and be able to walk more independently."

I LOVE CSH Giving Day is about celebrating the victories of children like Nikos and bringing awareness to the many children who need access to specialized care to thrive. The day raised more than \$15,000 for the **Transforming Lives 2.0** capital campaign that is funding the expansion of CSH services to more children throughout NJ, including a brand new, state-of-the-art outpatient center in Eatontown where Nikos will now receive his care. Frazier and his wife, Jackie, are honorary campaign co-chairs, helping us spread the word about the miracles that happen at CSH every day and raise the funds necessary to reach our \$45 million campaign goal.

"We are so grateful for the Fraziers' selfless commitment to this campaign," said Philip Salerno III, President and Chief Development Officer at CSH Foundation. "Their involvement has made a tremendous impact on the success of our first Giving Day and the capital campaign as a whole. Others have truly been inspired by them and that has helped us raise 80% of the funds we need to reach our goal." ■

When Ali was just two years old, she was in a car accident that resulted in a spinal cord injury that left her paralyzed from the waist down. An inspiration to all, Ali reminded our patients that "you *can* do the impossible—the impossible is just impossible until someone does it."

Ali was the first wheelchair-using actor to appear on a Broadway stage and also the first to be nominated for and win a Tony Award. Since then she has gone on to appear in many popular television shows and movies.

Ali's mission to improve the lives of others through the arts is captured in her motto: "Turning Your Limitations Into Your Opportunities." She speaks all over the world spreading this message and inspiring people to break the barriers that are holding them back.

When reflecting on the impact that CSH had on her life, Ali said, "Growing up with a spinal cord injury, one big theme is becoming independent. But when you are differently abled, the reality is that you're going to need help and support." She continued, "To have received this help and support from Children's at the very beginning set me on this track in a positive way. That has helped me create a wonderful life." ■

The first of four new outpatient centers funded by the **Transforming Lives 2.0** capital campaign was opened in November, 2021 as the Kenneth Esdale Pavilion CSH Outpatient Center. This state-of-the-art facility located in Union, NJ, incorporates a warm, friendly atmosphere with the latest technology so our patients have the best experience when they visit us. Using input from staff and our Family Faculty representatives in the design of the building and treatment rooms, this building represents a new standard of excellence for pediatric care in New Jersey and beyond.

Outside the treatment rooms is an equally important space—the playground—which was made possible by a \$450,000 grant from the Harold B. and Dorothy A. Snyder Foundation. Incorporating specialized equipment and play into the therapies that our patients receive makes the hard work they're doing at each visit fun. By incorporating fun, the children not only enjoy their visits and look forward to returning to CSH, but they are learning important skills to help them reach their next milestone.

The Harold B. and Dorothy A. Snyder Foundation exists to provide financial support and empower the development and innovation of institutions and individuals in New Jersey that hold high promise. Its objective is to nurture, cultivate and unleash the potential of organizations and individuals in ways

that will positively impact the most needy and underserved in their communities. The Snyder Foundation's main areas of focus have been healthcare, education, social services and faith-based initiatives with a particular emphasis on Union County residents and institutions.
