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




Speech Sound Milestones

Children vary in their development of speech and language skills. However, there is a "timetable" or natural progression that serves as a guide for typical development. These milestones help doctors, parents, and professionals determine when a child may need extra help to learn to speak and/or use language.

90% of children can pronounce these English consonants and consonant-blends by the specified age.







Expressive Language Milestones

0 to 6 Months

- Makes pleasure sounds (e.g. coos and gurgles)
- Expresses wants/needs through crying
- Repeats the same sounds
- Babbles various bilabial speech sounds (b, p, m)

6 to 12 Months

- Imitates speech sounds and simple intonation patterns
- Babbling includes large variety of speech sounds (w, j, m, n, p, b, d, h)
- Vocabulary of about 3 words
- Uses speech or non-crying sounds to get attention

1 to 2 Years

- Uses adult-like intonation patterns
- May omit final consonants
- By 15 months, first words pronounced
- By 24 months, vocabulary of 50 to 100 words
- Early words primarily nouns
- Starts to combine words (e.g. more cookie, mommy book)
- Continues to use vocalizations and/or gestures in addition to words to express wants/needs to express

2 to 3 Years

- Uses phrases containing 2 to 4 words
- Asks 1 to 2 word "wh" questions (e.g. "Where mommy?" "What that?"
- Exhibits multiple grammatical errors
- Speech is about 50 to 75% intelligible
- Increase variety of speech sounds, adds f, t, j, ng, g, k
- Vocabulary of 50 to 250 words

3 to 4 Years

- Uses increasing number of compound and complex sentences
- Speech is about 80% intelligible
- Continues to increase variety of speech sounds, adds v, s, l, sh
- Vocabulary of approximately 800 to 1,500 words

4 to 5 years

- Says most sounds, voice sounds are clear
- Uses sentences that give a lot of details with correct grammar
- Tells stories that stick to the topic
- Communicates easily with others

0 to 4 Months	suckle nipple	breast/bottle
4 to 6 Months	suckle from spoon	cereal, stage 1 baby foods
6 to 9 Months	munching, emerging tongue lateralization	teething biscuits, dissolvable crackers
9 to 12 Months	independent cup drinking	soft finger foods, introduce cup drinking
12 to 18 Months	lateral tongue movement, straw drinking	experimenting with a variety of tastes and textures
18 to 21 Months	rotary chew emerging	most table foods, bite-size pieces
24 + Months	mature chew	



Play and Social Milestones

Aware that objects exist when not Represents events less frequently seen; finds partially hidden toys 9 to 12 Months 30 Months experiences Does not mouth/band ALL toys; some Realistic props are used appropriately Play with a sequence Purposeful exploration of toys Reenact experienced events with new 13 to 17 Months 3 Years Hands toys to adult if unable to outcomes operate Associative play Carries out earlier play with dollhouse Functional play (e.g. pretends to sleep, drinks from cup) Imaginative play with blocks / sand 17 to 19 Months 3 to 3 ½ Years Use of tools Objects represent others Finds completely hidden toys Dolls/puppets participate in Play Problem-solving not based on Performs pretend activities on more experiences; plans ahead than one person/object (e.g. doll play) 3½ to 4 Years 19 to 22 Months Uses dolls/puppets to act out scenes Combines 2 toys in play (e.g. pours from pot into cup) 3-dimensional building Plans sequence of pretend events Represents daily experiences Imaginative; sets the scene without 24 Months Stacking/knocking down 4 to 5 Years realistic props Filling, pouring, dumping Cooperative play
